2025 ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

The WCA held its Annual General Meeting (AGM) on Wednesday, September 24th, at the Churchill Seniors' Centre. There were approximately 35 attendees including board members, municipal representatives, and guest speaker Toon Dreessen. The AGM fulfills provincial requirements and provides the board an opportunity to update the community on financial health, engagement, and initiatives that enhance Westboro's quality of life.

Councillor Jeff Leiper (Kitchissippi Ward), Councillor Theresa Kavanagh (Bay Ward), and Judy Lincoln from the Westboro Village BIA joined to provide informal updates. Key issues included the introduction of paid parking on Richmond Road, changes to Ottawa Public Health's beach water testing requirements, and intensification along the LRT corridor with a focus on affordable housing.


Treasurer Sue Morris reported strong finances, with total assets of \$50,586. Chair Len Tucker's annual report highlighted community achievements, including bike donations to a local shelter, involvement in heritage and planning issues, gardening at Clare Gardens Park, and participation in the OC Transpo bus crash inquest. The board also submitted a letter to the City's Chief Planner regarding concerns with minor variance adherence and continued charitable giving to local non-profits.

Social initiatives included the launch of the Westboro Dinner Club, now a popular social event for residents to meet and enjoy local cuisine. WCA membership was made voluntary, with an optional donation, encouraging broader participation. Committee updates included Heather Mitchell's "Flowers for Food" fundraiser and Barbara Parker's summary of gardening activities.

Jean McKibbon was honoured with the Ontario Service Award for 25 Years of Community Volunteerism, and Mr. Roland Dorsay conducted the election of the 2025-2026 board, welcoming Samantha Khalil and thanking Deb Chapman for her years of dedicated service.

The evening concluded with a talk by architect Toon Dreessen, highlighted later in this newsletter.

Heritage Matters

SAFEGUARDING OUR PAST: WCA AND HERITAGE OTTAWA COLLABORATE ON HERITAGE PRESERVATION

WCA has joined a Heritage Ottawa working group to determine how we can protect heritage properties from "demolition by neglect." Other cities in Ontario working within the same provincial policy framework manages to repurpose and cherish their heritage properties, while Ottawa does not. Our committee will work on solutions to improve this situation. Meanwhile, the WCA Heritage Committee will work on obtaining designation for 488 Edison, Ogilvy House; Nepean HS; 330 Churchill, Westboro Manor (the oldest house in Westboro); and John Cole homes in Highland Park.

PROTECTING OTTAWA'S BUILT HERITAGE

While bees and butterflies visited the cornucopia of native wildflower diversity, some small critter dined asters and liatris. They will survive, just as the well adapted plants shrugged off the drought. Black-eyed Susans and grasses are still lovely under snow! Seedheads will be left standing for winter, bird forage and insect habitat. The garden is supported by the WCA.

Clare Gardens Park Fall Clean Up a Big Success!




We are thankful for the great support our volunteer residents gave us during this year's park clean up.

PROTECTING WESTBORO GREENSPACE

Your WCA is advocating for the Cityowned lot, at 341 Berkley Avenue, to be rezoned from Residential to Greenspace.

This beautiful grassy spot is home to several mature trees, including a stunning maple, offering an oasis of environmental benefits for the whole community.

As Westboro intensifies, and our tree canopy shrinks, preserving existing green areas is more important than ever. Ideally located near the future Kichi Zibi LRT station and Crosstown Cycling Route, this site could become a natural pause point for neighbours and commuters alike.

WCA PLANNING & DEVELOPMENT EXPLAINER SERIES

PARTICIPATING AT A COMMITTEE OF ADJUSTMENT HEARING: PREPARATION PART I

The date has been set and is fast approaching. You feel you have something to say about the variance application, so you've registered to speak at the Committee of Adjustment hearing - AWESOME!! Now what?!?

- Go to the City's <u>Committee of Adjustment</u> website. There, you'll see numerous links. Click on "Hearings calendar, agendas, application info"
- 2. The original notice, received in your mailbox or posted on the applicant's property, will state the date of the hearing. Click on the appropriate year to find the details of your hearing.
- 3. Scroll down to the date of your hearing and click on the panel listed for your hearing date.
 - a. The three hearing panels for the Ottawa Committee of Adjustment are responsible for applications from three different geographic areas: urban (1), suburban (2), and rural (3). If there are multiple panels listed, click on the one that's relevant to you.
- 4. You'll now have the full agenda for the hearing in front of you. Note that multiple applications for variances and severances are heard at each hearing (six are listed for December 10, for example). Now scroll through the agenda to find the property you are concerned with. At first glance, there doesn't seem to be much information there ... until you click on the "paperclip" icon and there is a mountain of information to be had!

PARTICIPATING AT A COMMITTEE OF ADJUSTMENT HEARING: PREPARATION PART I

The PDF files linked in the pop-up window all contain important information about the variance application:

- The Notice.pdf gives details of the current state of the property and the associated variances requested.
- The Cover Letter.pdf will paint a more detailed picture of the request. Tthis usually includes justification of the application proposal, detailed site plans, and a tree plan amongst them.
- Separate from any mention in the cover letter of trees on site is the TIR.pdf (Tree Information Report) which is mandatory for any development proposal.

So how does this help? Much of the paperwork submitted by the applicant contains information you may find useful in presenting your case. Reading these files may raise questions you haven't already considered.

There's more to aid in your preparation but that will be in the next **Explainer** in this series.

In the meantime, if you need more immediate advice **contact the WCA**. We're always glad to help. You can also **contact** City councillor Jeff Leiper's office, or see **Comment on an Application** at "**Participate at a Hearing**" on the city website. Remember, there's no need for panic. Advice and help are available and questions are welcome!

(The Committee of Adjustment also deals with **consent** to sever a lot or adjust lot lines, and can grant **permission** to change land use and expand on a non-compliant land use structure - more on these in another article!)

WORKING TOGETHER FOR SAFER STREETS: WESTBORO SENIORS SAFETY MEETING RECAP

The next two pages cover highlights from the November 14 Seniors Safety Meeting.

ROAD SAFETY AND VULNERABLE ROAD USERS

John from **Safer Roads Ottawa** presented the City's Road Safety Action Plan, emphasizing education and visibility—especially for seniors, pedestrians, and cyclists. Key reminders included:

- **Be Safe, Be Seen:** Wear reflective clothing or use lights when walking or cycling.
- **Pedestrian Tips:** Press pedestrian buttons fully to activate the walk signal. Hold the button for an audible cue.
- **Sidewalk Safety:** Seniors raised concerns about bikes and scooters on sidewalks and the need for stronger cyclist education near schools and high-traffic areas.
- Infrastructure Advocacy: Participants discussed the benefits of early pedestrian start signals and broader traffic-calming measures.

PERSONAL SAFETY AND BYSTANDER SUPPORT

Personal Safety & Bystander Support Gerontologist and educator **Julie Lalonde** led a dynamic session on personal safety, offering practical strategies to respond to harassment or unsafe situations.

She highlighted the "5D's" of bystander intervention:

- 1. **Distract** Interrupt the situation safely.
- 2. **Delegate** Seek help from someone with authority.
- 3. **Document –** Record details if a crime is in progress.
- 4. **Delay** Check in afterward with the person targeted.
- 5. **Direct** Speak up calmly and clearly if safe to do so.

TRAFFIC AND SAFETY

TRANSIT SAFETY

Sergeant Josh Gibeault outlined safety measures currently in place on OC Transpo:

- Emergency Call Buttons/Boxes on buses and trains connect riders directly with transit staff.
- Cameras—both visible and hidden assist investigations and help keep riders safe.
- Riding Tips: Ask to be seated before the bus moves, and request a safer stop, particularly after 9 p.m.
- Emergency Contacts: Call 613-741-2478 or 911 for urgent situations.

Concerns raised by seniors included overcrowding, limited shade at bus stops, and accessibility challenges. Councillor Jeff Leiper noted ongoing bus fleet shortages and repair delays, reinforcing the need to continue advocating for safe, reliable transit —especially for vulnerable riders.

COMMUNITY DISCUSSION

Participants raised thoughtful ideas and concerns, including:

- Educating cyclists and scooter users about sidewalk rules.
- Better understanding and support for unhoused neighbours.
- Improvements to accessibility at bus stops across the city.
- Strengthening safety nets around housing-first policies.
- Exploring positivereinforcement incentives for youth who walk their bikes on sidewalks.

The message was clear: community connection matters, and Westboro residents play a vital role in advancing safety and compassion. As one participant said, "If not us, who?"

NEXT STEPS

- Continue advocacy with Councillor Jeff Leiper for safer streets and transit.
- Consider a future session on community safety and social supports, including Ottawa Community Housing and outreach staff.

SPEAKER SERIES

DESIGNING A CAPITAL WORTHY OF ITS NAME:

Mr. Toon Dreessen speaks at WCA's 2025 AGM

Mr. Toon Dreessen, leading local architect and well published advocate responsible for and meaningful architecture, brought a focused and inspirational presentation to the WCA's 2025 AGM in September. Mr. Dreessen's main focus was on the City of Ottawa's lack of desire to have impactful and inspirational architecture that would enhance its citizen's enjoyment and experience.



He noted a variety of examples where a few extra dollars or higher consideration for design appeal would have produced a more enjoyable and sustainable structure, such as the Chief Commanda bridge. Mr. Dreessen believes our city is lacking the architecture worthy of a G7 capital and hopes that we prioritize lasting design and architecture as a key merit for awarding city infrastructure and buildings.

WESTBORO COMMUNITY QUIZZARDS HELP TURN TRIVIA NIGHT INTO A WIN FOR LOCAL CAUSES




